Subject - Community Grant Scheme

Recommendation: It be RESOLVED: That:

1) the community grants listed at Appendix 1 as recommended by the Grants Panel be approved, subject to specific conditions relating to each application;

- 2) the community grant listed in Appendix 2 be declined as recommended by the Grants Panel;
- 3) the changes to the Small Grants Scheme agreed by the Panel, be noted; and
- 4) all Members be requested to promote the scheme within their wards.

Introduction

1. The Council's Community Grant Scheme makes provision for up to £130,000 per annum to be made available to community groups or organisations that meet the grant criteria of the Rother District Council (RDC) Community Grants Scheme, as agreed by Cabinet on 1 December 2008 (Minute CB08/115 refers).

Community Grants

2. A total of £71,499 was awarded during Round 1 of the Community Grants Scheme. The Panel has delegated authority to award grants under £500. The Panel used its delegated authority to approve £500 to Activate Youth Club on the 5 February 2018. Cabinet agreed to a fund of £10,000 from the Community Grants Scheme be approved for supporting community events to celebrate the forthcoming Royal Wedding of Prince Henry of Wales and Meghan Markle (Minute CB17/74 refers). This leaves a total of £48,001 for Round 2 of the Grant Scheme, as set out below:

- 3. Round 2 of the Rother Community Grants Scheme for 2017/18 closed on 15 January 2018. A total of 6 applications were received.
- 4. Cabinet is asked to consider the applications in Appendix 1 for funding from the Council's Community Grants Scheme as follows:

All awards are subject to other funding being in place.

- a) Bexhill Rowing Club £3,685
- b) Bexhill Festival of Music £1,607
- c) Pett Parish Council Working Group £1,000
- d) Crowhurst Village Hall £10,000
- e) Ticehurst Parish Council £29,735
- 5. Should Cabinet agree with the Panel's recommendation to award the applications at Appendix 1 then this will result in a maximum of £46,027 being awarded in Round 2. Once this amount is added to the amount awarded/committed as set out above (Table 1) the total amount spent from the overall budget of £130,000 will be £128,026.
- 6. Members are reminded that conditions are applied when awarding the grants which include that full funding is obtained in advance of any Rother payments being made and that RDC is acknowledged in any publicity and promotional material associated with these projects. Other specific conditions will also be applied to grants as appropriate.
- 7. The application from Westfield Parish Council, detailed in Appendix 2 is recommended to be declined by the Panel for the following reasons:
 - a) Failing to meet the criteria for the Community Grants Scheme as the project was for architect and structural engineer drawings to form part of the tender documents required to obtain quotes from contractors and therefore do not meet the scheme criteria as set out in the scheme quidance.

Crowhurst Village Hall

- 8. Cabinet had previously considered the application from Crowhurst Village Hall. However, Members were unclear as to how much of the requested funds were for an extension to the premises and how much was for renovation of the existing kitchen area. Members noted that the kitchen was used to produce school dinners. The importance of local provision being made to fund maintenance, repairs and replacement from generated income was emphasised. Cabinet had considered and agreed the Panel's recommendation to decline the application but invited Crowhurst Village Hall Management Committee to resubmit its application providing further detailed information (Minute CB17/22 refers)
- 9. Crowhurst Village Hall Committee has reviewed its plans and provided reassurance that this is a much needed new development. The plans show an extension to the Hall which will house a new kitchen and storage area, allowing a larger hall area to meet local community needs. The Management Committee further stated:

"The overwhelming desire to extend and create better kitchen facilities is also linked to the need to secure the future sustainability of the Crowhurst Village

Hall. User feedback regarding the current kitchen facilities is increasingly of the nature that they are inhibited by the small size and poor equipment within the kitchen which limits some potential hirers. The kitchen is small with limited space and users have indicated they would like to be able to prepare food rather than just bring in and serve

The village hall is also providing a much-needed facility for the school which does not have its own integral hall which can act as a dining room for school dinner. The school relies on access to the village hall to allow the contractor for school meals in East Sussex to have a place for delivering the meals, which are prepared off site, delivered to the school and served by the school to the children. This also provides a regular source of income adding to the sustainability of the hall."

10. Given the additional information provided by Crowhurst Village Hall Management Committee, the Community Grants Panel felt reassured and unanimously agreed to recommend the application to Cabinet.

Small Grant Scheme: On-line application process

- 11. In February 2017, the Panel agreed that further work be undertaken to encourage local groups to apply to the small grant fund of the Community Grants Scheme for grants up to £500. In order to make the scheme more accessible, a simplified application form and guidance had been agreed. The scheme would be a pilot for online applications. Additionally, the Panel had agreed that applications could be made at any time and would be processed continually throughout the year. Cabinet Members noted these changes in September 2017 (Minute CB17/22 refers).
- 12. These changes have now been made and the small grant scheme has been available for applications via an on-line application process since Monday 12 February 2018.
- 13. Members are asked to encourage groups within their wards to apply for small grants. Further information is available via the Community Grants Section of the Council website http://www.rother.gov.uk/communitygrantscheme.

Conclusion

14. Members are requested to consider the applications attached at Appendix 1 mindful of the clear benefits these offer to their communities. The application in Appendix 2 is recommended to be declined. The Community Grants Scheme offers a robust assessment process that benefits communities applying for grants and secures considerable additional value for money benefits for the Council.



Crowhurst Village Hall The grant is to redesign and develop the kitchen in Crowhurst village hall. The original kitchen was built in 1969 and has been maintained, however currently does not meet health & safety requirements and therefore the village hall is not able to offer reasonable facilities for its community. The project includes an extension to the building to accommodate the new kitchen facilities. This will require planning permission that has not yet been obtained.
