Digesting the figures

Sussex Police has changed processes for the recording of crime in line with national standards (Home Office Counting Rules). This changed the way crimes were counted and increased reported crime numbers nationally.

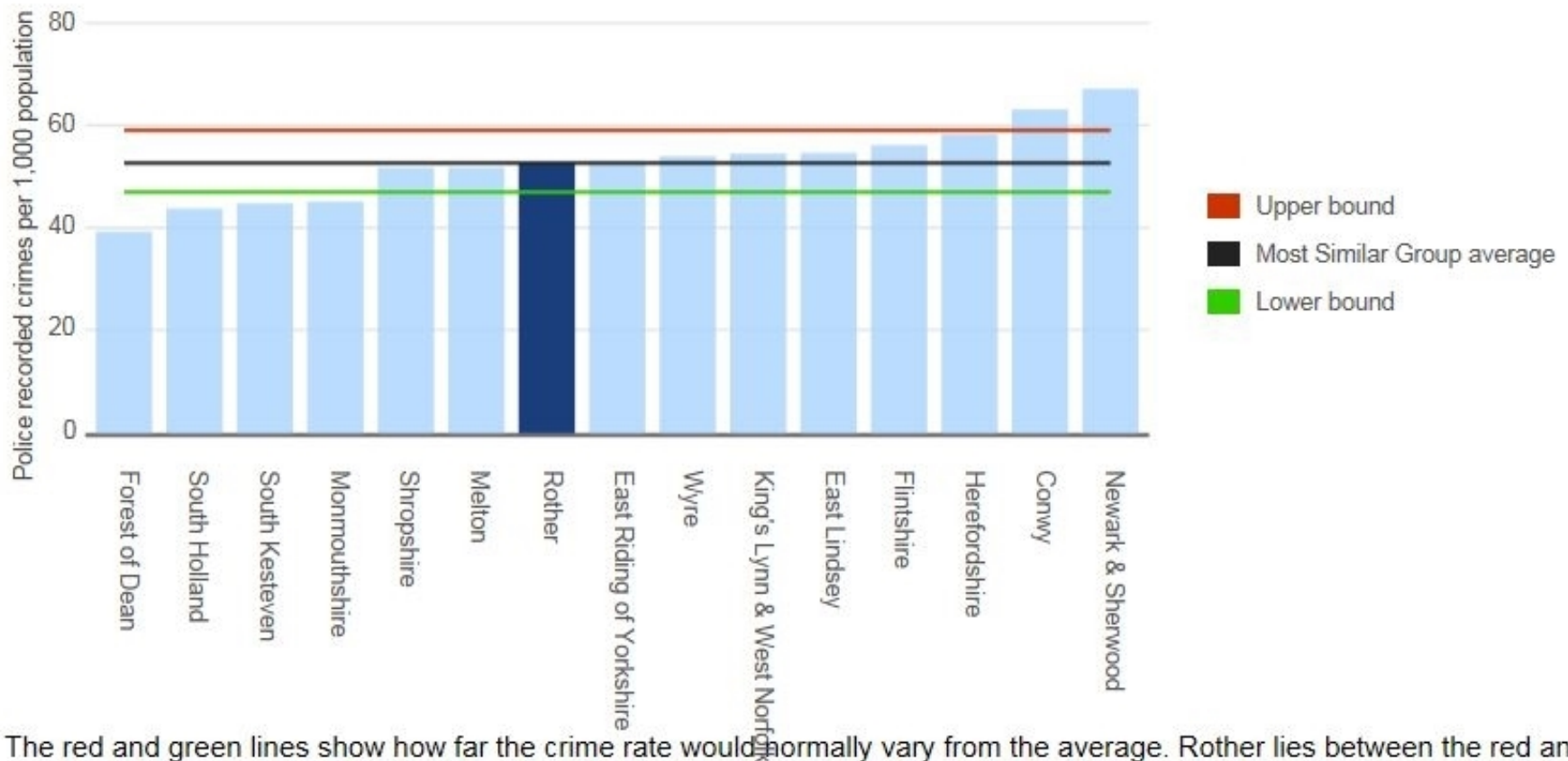
When last assessed by HMIC, Sussex Police were graded “good” with an accuracy of 95%.

Performance – 2017

- * Overall increase in crime of 18.2% (+ 784 offences)
- * Domestic abuse and sexual offences
- * Burglary OTD / dwelling
- * Public order and common assault
- * Vehicle crime
- * Shoplifting

Crime Comparison

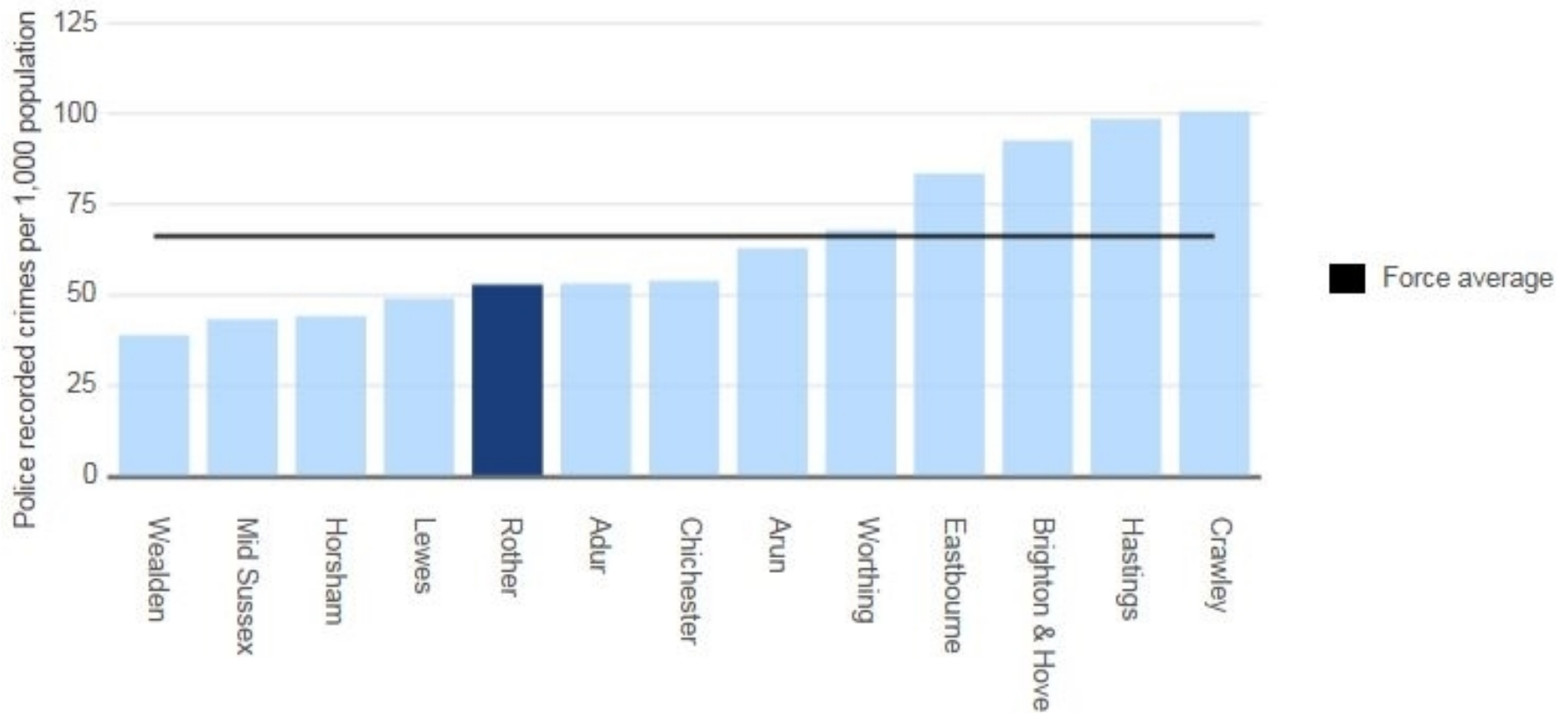
In the year ending September 2017, the crime rate in Rother was about the same as the average crime rate across similar areas.



The red and green lines show how far the crime rate would normally vary from the average. Rother lies between the red and green lines, so its crime rate is normal for the group.

Crime Comparison

In the year ending September 2017, the crime rate in Rother was lower than average for the Sussex force area.
